



PHILPEX '88 RULES AND REGULATION

EXHIBITS

The Philippine Philatelic Exhibition or PHILPEX has been organized as a national competitive philatelic exhibition to serve as prelude for club members and all locallybased stamp collectors before they can join any FIP or APS* sponsored international shows. The PHILPEX festivities celebrate PHILATELIC WEEK.

PHILPEX '88 is an open competitive exhibition without any classification, limited to postal and postally-related items only. This means that no revenues, fiscals, seals and documentary stamped papers will be allowed as the topic or subject for exhibition.

Here are the rules and regulations of this exhibition:

- 1. All members of IPPS regardless of residency, as well as any interested stamp collector who reside in the Philippines regardless of nationality, are eligible to enter this competitive exhibition.
- 2. Exhibits that have won the Gran Award and Best Philippine Exhibit in past PHIL-PEX shows cannot be entered fo competition.
- 3. Each entry should be entered with the prescribed application form, duly filled-up and signed by the prospective exhibitor.
- 4. It is imperative that the exhibitor is the sole owner of the collection displayed.
- 5. Upon acceptance, payment of the participation fees should be made in the amount of FIVE HUNDRED PESOS (₱500 or US\$25) as entrance fee per exhibit, plus TWENTY-FIVE PESOS (₱25 or US\$1.25) per 16-page frame. After payment has been made, entry and frame fees are not refundable.
- Each exhibitor may enter only one exhibit with a minimum of two frames up to a maximum of five frames. This means that the exhibit should have exactly either 32, 48, 64 or 80 pages. Additional materials sent exceeding the permitted number of sheets approved for exhibition will not be displayed.
- 7. Our limited number 16-page frames are reserved on a first-come-first-served basis. In case the 16-page frames will not be sufficient to accomodate all exhibits, local 6-page standard frames will be used. Therefore, all competitive exhibitors should be ready to submit either 36, 48, 60 or 78 pages instead of the usual 32, 48, 64 or 80 pages.
- 8. Collections arriving by mail must reach the exhibition organizer within the period of time between November 1-20, 1988. On the other hand, collections submitted thru the commissioners must reach the exhibition organizer between November 20-24, 1988. Reserved frames cannot be claimed for collections not received within the period of time specified.
- 9. Exhibition pages must contain only philatelic items and their corresponding writeups. Pictures, fancy art works or heavy illustrations should be strictly avoided.

^{*}FIP stands for the Federation Internationale de Philatelie, while APS refers to the American Philatelic Society to which IPPS is a chapter member.

- Mounting should be done on white or very light colored album sheets using a standard size of 8-½" x 11". Uniformity of mounting and write-ups using the English language is required.
- 11. All album pages must be numbered consecutively below at the right hand corner of the back pages, and enclosed in transparent protective sheets preferably acetate or mylar.
- 12. For purposes of confidentiality and protect against bias, no exhibit will be permitted to bear the name of the exhibitor on any album page.
- 13. Exhibits must be delivered, carriage paid, registered or insured at the expense of the exhibitor. In case there are no other pre-arranged transport for returning the exhibits, IPPS shall bear the cost of mailing exhibits thru the Philippine registered mail system at the exhibitors' risk.
- 14. All commissioners and exhibitors are welcome during mounting and dismounting of exhibits. However, no exhibit or any part thereof, may be removed from the exhibition before the end of the show.
- In grading and examination of exhibits, the jury will take into consideration the factors of –
 - a. Treatment and importance of exhibit;
 - b. Philatelic knowledge and research;
 - c. Completeness, condition and rarity; and
 - d. Neatness, arrangement and presentation.
- 16. Each exhibit will vie for the following awards:
 - Grand Award the Presidential Trophy for Philately donated by President Corazon Cojuangco-Aquino;
 - b. Best Philippine Exhibit donated by Vice-President Salvador P. Laurel; and
 - c. American Philatelic Society Chapter Medals in Gold, Silver or Bronze, and APS Best Research Award Medal.
- 17. While every care will be taken into consideration, the organizers, sponsors and exhibition committee members accept no responsibility for any loss or damage to exhibits.

PHILATELIC LITERATURE

In addition to the philatelic exhibition, there will be a competition for the best Philippine philatelic literature to promote the advancement of research. Like its counterpart, any person who is eligible as in Rule No. 1 may enter only one article on any topic or theme related to Philippine philately or postal history.

Similarly, the rules require submission of a duly accomplished application form; payment of a fixed entrance fee of FIVE HUNDRED PESOS (P500 or US\$25); and presentation of five copies of the article which has been typewritten on double-spaced text.

Each entry under the literature category will vie for the Best Research Award Trophy donated by Assistant Secretary Tagumpay Jardiniano of the Postal Services Office, together with American Philatelic Society Chapter Medals in Gold, Silver or Bronze. Certificates of Participation will be given to all participants. Award-winning entries may also be included in future club publications, or sent to other international philatelic magazines with the author's approval.






