Cattle Registration Stamped Papers 1906 to 1935

Act 1465 made cattle certificates with a stamped fiscal mandatory effective July 1, 1906. The Director of Printing, Manila, imprinted a fiscal stamp and serial number on each certificate. The design and value of this fiscal was the same but differed in color. Certificates of ownership used a blue stamp while transfer certificates were red. With about 30 years of printings, there are many shades of the two stamps. There is some evidence that the form minus the stamp and number could have been printed by the Government Printing Office, Washington, DC. For sure, the watermarked papers were manufactured in the United States.

The existence of watermarked certificates was first reported in the *Philippine Philatelic Journal*, second Quarter, 1992. This report was based on the examination of hundreds of examples by Nemi L. Rivera. However, it took additional research in 2001 by John Hunt to produce the classifications in this article. Every example adds to our knowledge and even the author's few examples made this listing possible. All collectors are urged to compare their holdings to this listing and contribute new findings. The range of serial numbers is especially in need of revision and corrections to it will better fix the quantities issued of each type.

By the examination of both **Table I** and **Table II**, you can see we know more about the ownership certificates than transfer ones. The serial numbers indicate that about 2 million more ownership certificates were made than transfers. However, actual examples of transfer certificates are even harder to find than these quantities indicate. The lower printing levels of transfer certificates resulted in no printings of Type I and IX certificates.

The watermarks (**Figures 1-5**) varieties are easy to identify. The watermarks may deteriorate but enough is always visible to identify. It is believed that most of the Type XI ownership certificates are unwatermarked. However, John Hunt owns serial number 7233036 with a LUNA BOND watermark. It is believed that this watermark only appears on a very small portion of the drying screen probably at the end of one side of the paper rolls. It is very rare and more information is needed.

Figure 6 illustrates the serial numbers. The two sizes of serial numbers are easy to measure. The serial number is the same color as the stamp except for Type I. All Type I certificates use red ink. Also note that for Types X, XI and XII the abbreviation for number is printed as part of the serial number with a period under the "o" of "No." In Figure 6, The "No." (period after the "No") you see on the first two serial numbers followed by a row of dots (under the number) are printed as part of the form in black. There is a strange progression in the size of the serial number in Type I and II. On the ownership certificates, The large serial number used on Type I continues into Type II but then changes to a smaller size. The latter variety is Type IIA. This progression is expected. However, for the transfer certificates, the first serial number observed is a small number that changes later to a large number. The small transfer number is Type IA. This is not expected as there is no Type II and Type III reverts back to a small number again. The only theory I have that could

explain this is that at least two printing machines were used to affix serial numbers. For the first 3-4 years, two type fonts were available and used. About 1910, only the large 5.2 mm font seems to have been available. The following chart shows these differences:

The form number only appears on Type XI and XII. Transfer certificates read "Municipal Form No. 28 (A)" in both English and Spanish with the English on top in a larger font size. Form 29 is used for ownership certificates.

There is a notice in the lower left that identifies the applicable Act or Section of the Administrative Code. For Types I through VII, the reference is to Acts 1147 and 1465 and is the same for both ownership and transfer certificates. For Types VII to XII, the notice is different for ownership versus transfer certificates but in the five hundreds. Ownership certificates cite Sections 517 and 519 while transfer certificates cite 511-536. All notices (Types I to XII) are in English and Spanish, again the English on top in a larger font size.

The date and print order number are needed to separate certain types. This includes Type I from II, Type VIII from IX, and Type XI from XII. The date year is printed in the second line under the title. The year is printed with a 19, 190, 191, or a 192 with or without a line following. The print order number is printed in the lower left under the Notice. However, starting with Type IV of transfer certificates only, it is located

on the reverse side. Also notice that the print order number does not change from 7-85 on the reverse of transfer certificates from Type IV to XI. However, for transfer Type XII certificates, it returns to the front as 10-106.

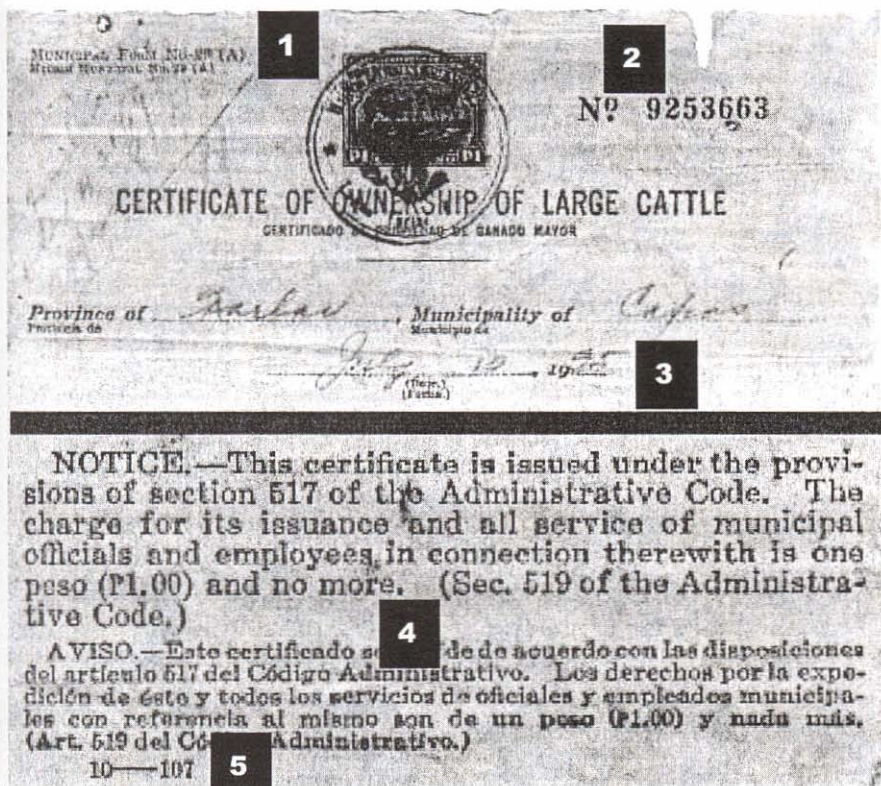
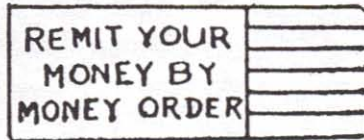


Figure 9. Type XII (Top piece and bottom left piece)

Only 4 examples of a Type I Certificate of Ownership (blue) are known. **Figure 7** shows an example with serial number 417,229 (in red). This certificate is dated March 2, 1909. Only three examples of a Type I certificate of transfer (red) are known. The earliest reported number is 328,346. **Figure 8** shows a Type IV Certificate of Transfer (red) with serial number 1,121,818 (red). **Figure 9**, shows a portion of a high number Type XII dated July 10, 1935 with a 9,253,663 serial number. Type XII Ownership documents can not exceed number 9,999,999 since the number sequence stamping machine was limited to seven digits.

There is one more major variety based on a color shade. Normally, one has to be careful with shades as many early inks used in Manila took on new shades if exposed to sunlight. However, we have a genuine color variety for the blue W-792, Type IV. The first half of this printing was blue. The second half of the printing is a definite green although some may call it blue-green. Table II shows the division of color by serial number based on about 25 examined certificates. The color differences apply to both the fiscal stamp and the serial number. Type IVA is the greenish variety.

A follow up article will discuss the remaining Commonwealth, Japanese Occupation and Victory certificates to 1946. There are three more watermarks in these issues but only a total of approximately eight more Types.

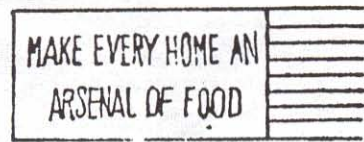

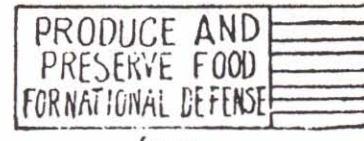

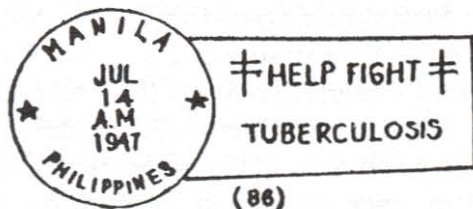

81) "WIKANG AMBANSANG NATIN, - ANG LAGI NATING GAMITIN." Boxed type - Handstamp. Slogan in caps in 2 lines with a comma after "NATING." English translation of slogan: "Use always our national language." Has 3 types and applied in purple. Type I, shows the latter "A" in "PAMBANSANG" with an accent. Type II, the "A" in "PAMBANSANG" is not accented. Type III, the "A" in "PAMBANSANG" is also accented and the "I" in "LAGI" bears an acute accent. First day use, Dec. 24/43. Used by the Manila Post Office for one week only, Dec 24-30/43.

82) "WE DEPEND UPON - GEN_ MacARTHUR'S - PLEDGE TO RETURN." Boxed type - Handstamp Plain slogan. Legend in 3 lines, .applied in purple. Earliest date seen, Dec. 23/43. Used on guerrilla covers franked with guerrilla stamps and townmark bears the inscription, "POSTED IN THE FREE PHILIPPINES - 23 DEC. 1943 - M.D. No 10 - Mindanao Guerrilla Area," in caps and lower cases in 4 lines. Applied in purple.

83) "LABOR DAY - CALLING ON ALL LABORERS - HELP YOUR COUNTRY - SECURE EMPLOYMENT WITH U. S. ARMY FOR ESSENTIAL WAR WORK." Straightline type - Handstamp. Plain slogan in 5 lines, in purple. Used for one day only, May 1/45. on the occasion of the First Day Issue of 8¢, 1-P and 20¢ Special Delivery of the regular postage "Victory" series.

84) "V". Straightline type -Handstamp. Slogan cancel with a single letter "V" measuring 2 x 2.2 cm. in the center supported by 5 straight horizontal lines on both sides of the letter. Used in Fabrica, Negros Occidental. Earliest date seen, March 25/46. Note: - This is the first slogan cancel of the Philippines since the liberation. Similar slogan cancels were used by the United States, Canada and England during the

hectic years of World War II.

85) "HELP THE - (Sign of Red Cross)-PHILIPPINE RED CROSS." Boxed type = Handstamp. Slogan cancel in 3 lines. Applied in black, purple and purple black. First day use, Oct. 28/46. Last day, Nov. 28/46. Used also as backstamp on intra-island airmail.

86) "HELP FIGHT - TUBERCULOSIS."

87) "JOIN THE 1947 - ANTI-TB DRIVE."

88) "HELP - RAISE FUND AGAINST TB."

Boxed type -- Handstamp. Slogan cancels in 2 lines but the 3rd (No. 88) in 3 lines. First day use, July 14/47. Last day, Aug. 31/47. Used also as backstamp on interisland airmail.

89) "COLLECT STAMPS - BE A STAMP - COLLECTOR NOW."

90) "COLLECTING STAMPS IS EDUCATIONAL - CULTURAL HOBBY." Straightline type - Handstamp. Slogan cancels in 3 lines. First day use, Oct. 19/47. Last day Oct. 25/47.

Note: - First day use of these two slogan cancels was on the occasion of the "Ladies Day" of the Philippine Philatelic Club, Manila.

91) "EXHIBITION HALL - NAPEX - POSTAL STATION."

92) "CULTURAL - FIRST DAY ISSUE - EDUCATIONAL." Straightline types - Handstamp. Slogan cancels: No. 91 in 3 lines, and No. 92, in 4 lines. Used for one day only, Nov. 28/47, on the occasion of the National Philatelic Exhibition (NAPEX), conducted by the Philippine Philatelic Club, Manila, and First Day Issue of the 4¢ Quezon Souvenir Sheet.

93) "A NEW CITY IS - BORN." Boxed type - Handstamp. Slogan cancel in 2 lines. Used for one day only, Jan. 1/48, in Dagupan City.

94) "HET.P YOUR. INT)PPFNDENT - PHILIPPINE NATIONAL RED CROSS - FIRST ANNUAL FUND CAMPAIGN - FEBRUARY 1-29, 1948." Boxed type - Handstamp. Slogan cancel in 4 lines. First day use. Jan. 26/48. Last day, Feb. 29/48. Used also as backstamp on domestic airmail. Note: - Has 4 types. Type I, with 2 stars in the dial. Type II, without stars, Type III, with one star. And Type 1a, with a small dial.

95) "CONTRIBUTE TO - UNITED - NATIONS - APPEAL FOR - CHILDREN." Fancy type Handstamp. Slogan cancel in 5 lines with a motif "UNAC" and 2 hands inset in a circle and "GIVE ONE DAY" inscribed outside the circle. First day use, March 16/48. Last day, April 15/48, incidentally, same . day Pres. Manuel A. Roxas died. Used also as backstamp on domestic airmail

96) "COLLECT STAMPS -- ORGANIZE A - STAMP CLUB IN -YOT IR COMMUNITY." Boxed type - Handstamp Slogan cancel in 4 lines. First day rise, April 16/48. Last day, May 15/48. Used Also as backstamp on domestic airmail.

102) "TRAVEL AROUND THE WORLD VIA PHILATELY-START COLLECTING - STAMPS NOW. INQUIRE: STAMP & PHILATELIC DIVISION." Fancy type - Handstamp. Plain slogan in 6 lines on the left and -an outline of a modern steamer on the right inset in a circle. Applied in red, green and purple. Earliest date seen, Oct. 2/48, and latest, Jan. 22/49. Used by the Stamp & Philatelic Division, Bureau of Posts, Manila

103) "AVIATION -- PROMOTES PROGRESS & - SECURITY. DEC. - AVIATION - WEEK - 1218." Fancy type - Handstamp. Slogan cancel in 8 lines. First day use, Dec. 12/48 (Sunday). Last day, Dec. 18/48. Used also as backstamp on domestic airmail. Note: - First slogan cancel under the Republic with the slogan before the townmark.

104) "FIRST NATIONAL - JAYCEE -- CONVENTION - FEB. 1113, 1949." Boxed type - Handstamp. Slogan cancel in 4 lines. First day use, Feb. 5/49. Last day, Feb. 13/49. Used also as backstamp on domestic airmail. Note: - Dial of this slogan cancel on Feb. 5 and 8, bears no year (1949) but "PM" (time) only.

108) "THE JAYCEES - TRAILBLAZERS IN-CIVIC CONSCIOUSNESS." Boxed type - Handstamp. Slogan cancel in 3 lines. First day use, March 16/49. Last day, March 30/49. Used also as backstamp on domestic airmail.

109) "PHILATELIC - Literary Musical - AIRCAST - DZFM -710 Kc - Every SATURDAY - 6:45 P.M." Fancy type - Handstamp. Plain slogan in 5 lines and boxed with "perforations" all around.
