1944 "VICTORY" OVERPRINTS

As the end of World War II approached in the Pacific, the U.S. Bureau of Engraving and Printing overprinted the 1939 "Commonwealth" issue with "Victory" in black. These stamps would not arrive in the Philippines until January 1945. However, in November and December 1944, as areas became liberated, small quantities of stamps that had been saved in the Philippines from the pre-war period were locally handstamped "Victory" in violet. Two varieties of the "Running Messenger" were overprinted, both the 1919 regular issue on December 4, 1944 and the 1939 Commonwealth issue on November 8, 1944.
