The quantity of any type of E3 Special Delivery OB overprint variety is presently unknown. In the Coughlin's Catalog of Bandholtz OB Overprint, each E3 OB overprint variety is given an approximate quantity of 50 copies. Still, they are very scarce! I wonder how many of them have survived.
